# About the organisers

## **What is GIZ?**

As a service provider with worldwide operations in the field of international cooperation for sustainable development, GIZ works together with its partners to develop effective solutions that offer people better prospects and sustainably improve their living conditions. GIZ is a public-benefit federal enterprise and supports the German Government as well as many public and private sector clients in a wide variety of areas, including economic development and employment, energy and the environment, and peace and security.

## **What is IWaSP?**

The International Water Stewardship Programme (IWaSP) is an international programme for water security that combines global best practices in water stewardship with local knowledge. GIZ manages IWaSP on behalf of the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and the UK Department for International Development (DFID). The six-year programme (2013-2018) supports partnerships between public authorities, private companies and civil society to address shared threats to water security while improving stakeholders' use and management of water, and building their capacity to jointly develop their own solutions. It is currently being implemented in South Africa, Zambia, Uganda, Tanzania, Kenya and the Caribbean.

## **What is the SWPN?**

The Strategic Water Partners Network (SWPN) was established in 2011. It is a multi-stakeholder platform, brokered by the 2030 WRG (Water Resources Group), chaired by the Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS), and co-chaired by South African Breweries (SAB) on behalf of business. The SWPN is a growing network of members that serves as a coordination platform between the South African private sector, Government and civil society organisations to jointly find solutions for the country's most threatening water issues. The SWPN aims to galvanise private sector activities and collective action across different sectors and industries in order to close the projected water supply-demand gap. The New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) Business Foundation hosts the SWPN.

## **What is the NBI?**

The National Business Initiative (NBI) is a voluntary coalition of South African and multinational companies, working towards sustainable growth and development in South Africa and the shaping of a sustainable future through responsible business action. Since its inception, the NBI has made a distinct impact in the spheres of housing delivery, crime prevention, local economic development, public sector capacity building, Further Education and Training, schooling, public private partnerships, energy efficiency and climate change. The NBI is a global network partner of the World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD), the focal point of the United Nations Global Compact (UNGC) Local Network in South Africa and an implementation partner of the World Resources Institute (WRI).
